

#### The Constitution as a Basis for Monitoring of Elected Representatives





- Elected Representatives derive their powers for functioning through the Constitution.
- They are mandated to Attend Sessions, Raise people's Issues, Debate, Participate in Discussions and Pass legislations.
- The Constitution defines their powers and rules of functioning, hence only the Constitution can provide the parameters for their monitoring.

#### **Change in Report Card Matrix**



#### **Rationale for Change:**

- Praja released its first Elected Representative report card in 2011 for Mumbai and since then have published 27 report cards in Mumbai and Delhi.
- The initial matrix i.e. till 2019, had two major components quantitative, based on deliberative duties of the MLAs laid out in the constitution and through legislation and qualitative, based on citizen's perception of ERs performance.
- Over the years, Praja has seen that there is a direct correlation between the deliberative component and citizens' perception as performance of the ERs directly affect the quality of life of constituents which in turn improves citizens' perception.





During COVID-19, it was seen that the duration of sessions declined, thus Praja did not publish annual report cards and instead decided to publish a 'Consolidated Two Years Report Card' this year for the period from Winter Session 2019 to Monsoon Session 2021.





# On Average, Duration of Sessions Decreased by 77% from 2<sup>nd</sup> Year of the 12<sup>th</sup> Assembly to 2nd Year of the 14<sup>th</sup> Assembly




#### Sessions conducted and MLA attendance from 12th, 13th & 14th Assembly



- The average duration per session in the 12<sup>th</sup> Assembly was 15, while the average per session in the 14<sup>th</sup> Assembly was only 6 days.
- Moreover, trend analysis shows, that the duration of sessions declines as the term progresses.
- For instance, in the 13th assembly –
  the duration declined by 52% from
  50 days in the first year (winter
  2014 to monsoon 2015) to 24 days
  in the last year (winter 2018 to
  monsoon 2019) of the term.


 While other states like Karnataka and Rajasthan were the highest with 31 and 29 sittings respectively in 2020.

# 95% Decrease in Deliberations from 11,049 in 2nd Year of 12<sup>th</sup> Assembly to 574 in 2<sup>nd</sup> Year of 14<sup>th</sup> Assembly



#### Number of Questions asked by MLAs from 12th, 13th & 14th Assembly



- The decline in duration of sessions in a term, further impacted overall questions asked on citizens' issues.
- For instance, in the 13<sup>th</sup>
  Assembly, overall questions asked declined by 23% from 4,402 in the first year to 3,373 in the last year of the term.

## 75% decline in Questions Asked from Winter 2014 – Monsoon 2016 to Winter 2019 - Monsoon 2021





- 82% decline in questions asked on education from Winter Session 2014 Monsoon Session 2016 to Winter Session 2019 Monsoon Session 2021.
- Similarly, 61% decline in questions asked on health and a 73% decline in questions asked on housing.

Note: Other issues include agriculture, animal husbandry, defense, foreign affairs, irrigation, scams, legal, salt pans, scooping and mining etc.

## 73% Decline in MLA Deliberations on Housing, Health & Education from First Year of 12<sup>th</sup> Assembly to First Year of 14<sup>th</sup> Assembly





As Mumbai recovers from the pandemic, it is time to increase the duration of sessions with the use of technology wherever possible.

This can bring an increase in the duration of sessions as well as in attendance and will thus improve deliberations on citizens' issues in a more efficient manner.






#### Only 1 out 31 of MLAs Have Achieved an Overall Grade (Above 80%) in 14th Assembly








#### None of the 31 MLAs achieved a Good Score in Quality of Questions Asked










## **Top and Bottom 20 Percentile Average Scores**


